




**Giuliano Grassi** was born in Melzo (Italy) in 1960.

His first art-exhibition is dated in 1982, it was his first personal exhibition in the halls of the Town Library of Melzo. Since 1988 he is a member of G.A.M. (Gruppo Artistico Melzese).

Giuliano participated in many art exhibitions not only in Italy but also abroad. Among those as more important events one can choose the personal exhibition in June 1989 which took place in Poland in Lublin, in the City Gallery MDK and in September of the same year another exhibition, this time in Paris where Giuliano was one of European artists to paint together as a group "Soleil bleu" and to create the biggest picture in the world - 150 m<sup>2</sup> entitled "Uomo" - "Man".

Since 1990 he creates his pictures together with his wife - Anna and so their pictures have two authors and are made with four hands.

**Anna Dejneka** was born in Lublin (Poland) in 1964. She is graduated at the University of Maria Curie-Skłodowska (UMCS) in Lublin at the faculty of Modern Arts - she is specialized in graphic arts.

Since 1990 they together took part in many art-exhibitions not only in Italy but also abroad, hereby are presented only some more interesting examples like: exhibition in Paris in 1990 at Croixment, in Curitiba (Brasil) in 1993 at the Paranaese Centre of Culture, in 1993 they presented their picture at the Palace of Permanente in Milan. In 1994 there were another interesting exhibition in Ostrava (Czech Republic) in Vytvarneh Umni Gallery. In 1996 they prepared a picture and three special envelopes for the space-mail which was received in the Space by the members of the craft of the Russian space station "Mir". The picture and envelopes commemorated the meeting in the Space between the astronauts from the American Shuttle "Atlantis" and Russian Space station "Mir". In the year of Jubilee 2000 their picture entitled "LUX" was received in Rome personally by the Pope John Paul II.
